Sherrif asks ICPC to reject frivolous petitions

YOLA—GOVERNOR Modu Sherrif of Borno has called on ICPC not to entertain petitions with political undertone.

Sherrif made the call yes-terday in Yola at a three-day national conference on corruption organised by the National Assembly committee

on corruption.

He recalled that early this year, the anti-graft agency invited more than 30 officials of Borno government to its Abuja office over a petition. He said that Borno Government declined to send the affected functionaries to Abuja but advised ICPC to

send its officials to the state.
Sherrif, represented by Alhaji Baba Njidda, the Secretary to the State Government, said it would have been dif-ficult for the operatives to move the officials to Abuja without being compromised.

The governor said the anti-graft agency did not send its officials to the state because the petition was later found to have

He, therefore, urged the commission to refrain from inviting innocent government functionaries to Abuja over frivolous petitions.

According to the gover-

nor, public funds were usunor, public funds were usually spent on such trips, adding that most petitions alleging financial impropriety against public office holders were motivated by malice. Earlier, ICPC Chairman Emmanuel Ayoola had said that the conference was organised to enable anti-corruption committees at the national state and

mittees at the national, state and local government levels to brainstorm on how to energise the crusade.

Ayoola said that apart

from the prosecution of sus-pects, he believed the war against corruption would only succeed when Nigerians were made to regard corruption as an evil act.

The minister said this in Ilorin during the 27th conference of directors of land

in federal and state ministries.
According to the Minister,

who was represented by the Permanent Secretary of her ministry, Mr. Otaki Oyigbenu, said this was undoubtedly a major issue to be addressed in the land reform agenda of the Federal Government which was

farmers are disadvantaged

because of the absence of marketable titles to their farm lands adding that the Housing delivery system has also performed poorly because of the absence of registerable title to most land holdings which was part of the cause of the estimated 17 million housing deficit in Nigeria.

The minister noted that, "There is need for a conscious management and administrative effort that will effectively harness

the vast potentials in our national land resource to put it to its

highest and best use". She disclosed that the Presidential Committee on affordable Housing is working out a programme to ensure that all Nigerians have access to decent and affordable housing adding that all perceivable impediments are being addressed to reduce the burden of financing housing development entirely from equity capital.
